Achievements:

1. Co-inventor of the Port-a-wrap, with 2 USA patents.
2. Inventor of rope tools "loopie" and "balancer".
3. ISA (International Society of Arboriculture) Midwest Chapter (7 states) Tree Climbing Champion in 1979, a safety-based competition with 5 events.
4. Illinois Arborist Association (IAA) President in 2009, a Chapter of the ISA.
5. Lead instructor for the IAA's Advanced Training Program, since its inception in 2005. A program designed to help ISA Certified Arborists enhance their skills and obtain CEU's. I have trained over 300 IAA members.
6. Program Presenter for the ISA, TCIA, IAA, Wisconsin Arborist Association, Indiana Arborist Association, Kentucky Arborist Association, Ohio Arborist Association, Iowa Arborist Association, Purdue University, Steven's Point University, Mid-State Technical College, Milwaukee Area Technical College, Municipalities, Park Districts, Townships, Tree Care Companies in NE Illinois.
7. Organizer for the Illinois Tree Climbing Championship from 1998 to 2015 and now in 2019. This entails securing a site for the competition, getting 30 – 35 volunteers to judge the 5 events, getting prizes for the top 3 winners of each event, setting the 5 events up so they are safe for the competitors and spectators.
8. Judged at the International Tree Climbing Championship (an International event with competitors from all over the world) in 1997 to 2003, 2005 to 2010, 2012 and 2013. There are 62 to 67 competitors for this. Every year as a scoring judge at either the Work Climb or Aerial Rescue events, the 2 most subjective events to score. I was also asked to judge the Master's Challenge event 6 times. The Master's Challenge event takes the top 5 male scorers and top 3 female scorers who compete for the World title.
